INTRODUCTION

The registration and regulation of officials is a basic function of the Alabama High School Athletic Association. According to Rule IV of the AHSAA Bylaws, only officials who are registered with the AHSAA may be used by member schools as officials in football, basketball, baseball, softball, volleyball, wrestling, track and soccer interscholastic contests.

This Officials' Guide is designed to familiarize officials with all the procedures and guidelines of the AHSAA officiating program. Each official association affiliated with the AHSAA, as well as each member school, is provided a copy of this guide.

All officials have access to the AHSAA Officials Guide and the Officials Manual for their sport on the AHSAA web site (www.AHSAA.com).

Officials receive NFHS Rules Publications. Official rulings and interpretations of special play situations which are made by the AHSAA Executive Director before and during the season of each sport. The AHSAA abides by the National Federation of High School Associations playing rules in all sports. The final authority concerning interpretation of all playing rules remains with the AHSAA. The AHSAA has authority to implement playing rules in addition to those of the National Federation of High School Associations.

The AHSAA reserves the right to change any procedure or statement located in this Officials' Guide without prior notice in order to better serve our officiating program.

AHSAA GOAL FOR OFFICIALS

To attempt to provide an opportunity for all officials to improve themselves as officials while upgrading the quality of their local associations. This attempt should coincide with a greater effort by the officials to provide consistency throughout the state in all officiating. The officials will then promote an enhanced spirit of the high school philosophy as teachers and role models for all students involved in interscholastic competition.

CODE OF ETHICS

This Code of Ethics for all officials has been established by the Alabama High School Athletic Association. The purpose of the Code is to establish guidelines for ethical standards of conduct for all officials.

1. An official must devote time, thought and study to the rules of the game and the mechanics necessary to carry out these rules so that one may render effective and creditable service in a fair and unbiased manner.
2. An official must work with fellow officials and the state association in a spirit of harmony and cooperation in spite of differences of opinion that may arise during debate of points or rules at issue.
3. An official must resist every temptation and outside pressure to use one's position as an official to benefit oneself. Under all circumstances, officials must avoid promoting the special interest of any person or group of persons other than the athletes we serve.
4. An official must constantly uphold the honor and dignity of the avocation in all personal conduct and relations with the student-athletes, coaches, athletic directors, school administrators, colleagues and the public to be a worthy example to the athletes under one's jurisdiction.
5. An official will be prepared both physically and mentally, dress according to expectations and maintain a proper appearance that is befitting the importance of the contest.
6. An official must remember and recognize that it is important to honor contracts regardless of possible inconvenience or financial loss.

Every member of the officiating profession carries a responsibility to act in a manner becoming a professional person. The conduct of any official influences the attitude of the public toward the profession in general as well as toward the official in particular.

Officials may be reprimanded, fined and/or suspended for any conduct unbecoming of an official registered with the AHSAA. The Code of Ethics falls into this category.

LETTER OF INQUIRY

The AHSAA may at anytime send an Official Letter Of Inquiry to a local association or to an individual official. This Letter Of Inquiry seeks information pertaining to the subject matter as it is stated in the letter. A local association or an individual official shall respond to the Letter Of Inquiry within one week. If a response from the appropriate party is not received by the AHSAA within this one week period, disciplinary action may be taken against the party. The local association contact person and President are the people primarily responsible for getting this done. They are subject to disciplinary action if it is not done within the allowed time period.

AHSAA AFFILIATION

Local officials associations are affiliated with the AHSAA as a Regular Association or a Restricted Association. Each member of the local association is deemed an Independent Contractor and must apply to become registered with the AHSAA in order to qualify to work AHSAA contests. Each local association is not limited to working only AHSAA contests. Each member school of the AHSAA must contract their contests with an AHSAA-affiliated association. All AHSAA-affiliated associations and their members must abide by the policies set forth in the AHSAA Officials Guide.

Regular Associations and their members who maintain AHSAA affiliation are eligible to work Varsity, Junior Varsity, Junior High or Middle School contests played by the AHSAA member schools. Other policies or assignment procedures outlined in this guide may limit which contests an individual official will work.

Restricted Associations and their members who maintain AHSAA affiliation are eligible to work Junior High or Middle School contests played by the AHSAA member schools. Other policies or assignment procedures outlined in this guide may limit which contests an individual official will work.

APPLICATION & REGISTRATION PROCEDURE

1. Local association begins collecting application fees from prospective members and submit the application fees to the State Office. (New and Returning Prospective Members) All Application fees sent via mail must be sent from the appropriate local association officer to the state office via check or money order. Cash will not be accepted unless delivered in person. Application fees are non-refundable.
2. Local association officers attend district meeting to obtain books and materials.
3. Local associations begin meeting, distributing rule books and preparing applicants for the online rules clinic and exam.
4. Applicants must complete an online required clinic and take the online pre-registration exam. Applicant will not be allowed to test for registration until his application fee has been processed by the state office via his local association.
5. Online Rules Clinic and Test Results automatically entered into database. Results are obtained online by designated officers and individual applicant.
6. State Office begins registration of each applicant.
 - (a) Current classification determined and confirmed.
 - (b) Current classification entered into each applicant's record.
 - (c) All eligible applicants processed in computer.
 - (d) Officials cards printed with receipts.
 - (e) Daily transaction journal printed.
 - (f) Master history file updated.
 - (g) Officials cards with receipts along with patches mailed to each local association.
7. Officials are considered to be registered when they receive their officials cards and patches from a designated local association officer. If additional patches are desired by individuals, each individual will make the request to the designated local association officer. The designated local association officer will then place the order with the State Office. These registration cards are for identification purposes only and do not entitle the bearers or anyone else free admission to any AHSAA event. Also, these cards are non-transferable. A registered official may identify themselves in non-AHSAA contests by wearing the AHSAA logo. If this is done, the complete AHSAA required uniform must be worn. Anyone who improperly uses these cards or patches will be subject to penalty.

8. The AHSAA reserves the right not to register an individual applicant or group of applicants. This AHSAA action voids the applicants membership in any AHSAA sanctioned local association.
9. Any college or high school student age 16 or above is exempt from taking the Pre-registration Exam if they have completed a current (same year) sports officiating course in that sport.

INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR STATEMENT

All officials understand that they are independent contractors officiating for the schools serviced by their local associations and the AHSAA. They agree to abide by the constitution and by-laws of their local association with whom they voluntarily choose to affiliate. They also agree to abide by all the rules and regulations of the AHSAA with whom they voluntarily choose to affiliate.

They also understand that they are independent agents choosing to affiliate with their local association and the AHSAA. Therefore, they release their local association officers and the AHSAA staff from any liability or responsibility for any damage or injury incurred by them to themselves or anyone else because of their officiating during the current registration year.

They understand that from time to time the AHSAA or its designee may film, record or photograph certain games they officiate. They further understand that the AHSAA or its designee may use their voice, image or likeness from these games in connection with certain video, audio or print reproductions designed to be used for educational purposes, and they hereby consent to the use of their voice, image and likeness for such purposes.

They voluntarily choose to contract with the AHSAA member schools through their local association by which they will receive their game assignments and payment of game fees.

Finally, they understand that all taxes due on the income collected by them because of their officiating are their responsibility to file and not the responsibility of their local association or the AHSAA.

RECIPROCITY OF REGISTRATION

1. If an individual is already registered for the current registration year in another state and wishes to apply and register in Alabama, the individual will still have to pay the application fee in Alabama, then view the online clinic and pass the online exam in order to be registered in our state.
2. Written notification from the previous state's Executive Director will be needed to verify a transfer of experience from the previous state. Officials who transfer into Alabama from another state may receive credit in Alabama for experience in the other state.
3. In order to transfer membership from one local association in Alabama to another during the season, a letter from the individual needs to be sent to the State Office requesting the transfer. The State Office will update the individuals state file and will check to make sure all obligations have been fulfilled to the previous association. The State Office will then send a letter back to the individual and a copy of the letter to both associations approving the transfer.

- Basketball — Class IV, Class III, Class II, Class I and Restricted

New Classification Requirements

- 1) District Director's Ratings - This counts 25 points of the overall classification rating. A rating of 0 through 5 is given by the District Director based upon the ratings in the AHSAA Official's Guide. This rating remains in place until changed at a future directors meeting.
- 2) District Camp Attendance - This counts as 5 points of the overall classification rating. This is added to the overall classification rating. This bonus for district camp attendance will remain in effect for 2 years.
- 3) Local Meeting Attendance - This counts 9 points of the overall classification rating. This is a percentage of association meetings. Association attendance will be verified by the District Directors. This will be calculated annually.
- 4) Classification Test Score - This counts 35 points of the overall classification rating. This is the score made on the classification test given each year. The most recent classification score will be the one used. The classification test must be taken every 3 years. If no test taken, this will result in a zero for this part of the classification rating.
- 5) Years of Experience - This counts 10 points of the overall classification rating. This is a scale of years experience:
 - a. 1 - 4 years = 1 point
 - b. 5 - 8 years = 2 points
 - c. 9 - 12 years = 4 points
 - d. 13 - 16 years = 6 points
 - e. 17 - 20 years = 8 points
 - f. 21 years and above = 10 points

- 6) Assignment Acceptance - This counts 5 points of the overall classification rating. This is a percentage of assigned games by the local association, accepted and officiated by the official. This will be calculated annually.
- 7) Coaches Ratings - This counts 3 points of the overall classification rating. This is an average of the ratings given by coaches throughout the officials career.
- 8) Local Association Ratings - This counts 3 points of the overall classification rating. A rating of 0 through 5 is given by the Local Association based upon the ratings in the AHSAA Official's Guide. This will be calculated annually.
- 9) Observer's Evaluation Ratings - This counts 5 points of the overall classification rating. This is an average of the ratings given by all observers throughout the officials career.

BONUS OPPORTUNITIES:

- 1) State Camp Attendance - This counts as a 4 points bonus of the overall classification rating. This is added to the overall classification rating. This bonus for state camp attendance will remain in effect for 5 years.
- 2) State Camp Ratings - This counts as a 2 points bonus of the overall classification rating. A rating of 0 through 5 is given by the State Camp Staff based upon the ratings in the AHSAA Official's Guide for those officials who attended the state camp. This bonus for state camp attendance will remain in effect for 5 years.
- 3) State Office Ratings - This counts as a 3 points bonus of the overall classification rating. A rating of 0 through 5 is given by the State Office based upon the ratings in the AHSAA Official's Guide for those officials who work in the championship events.
- 4) Multiple Sport Officiating - This counts as a 2 points bonus of the overall classification rating. This is added to the overall classification rating. This bonus for multiple sport officiating will be applied to all sports worked by the official. This will be calculated annually.
- 5) Recruitment - This counts as a 3 point bonus of the overall classification rating. This is added to the overall classification rating. This bonus is for each new official recruited for that school year up to 3 new officials. This bonus will be calculated annually.
- 6) Mentor - This counts as a 3 point bonus of the overall classification rating. This is added to the overall classification rating. This bonus for each official that remains an official for 3 years (no more than 3 officials per year). This bonus remains in effect from the 4th year until the end of the 6th year that official remains active.

The classification scale is as follows:

Class IV =	95 and above
Class III =	85 to 94.9
Class II =	75 to 84.9
Class I =	74.9 and below

AHSAA CAMPS

AHSAA Officials Camps are held to aid in the improvement of officials. Intensive training, including rules study and on-the-field/court mechanics, prepare the officials for the next year's season. These camps are open only to officials who were registered in that sport the previous year. Officials are not required to attend AHSAA camps to work state championship contests.

Member School Participation

An AHSAA member school may participate at any time during the year in one local official's workshop or one AHSAA District Official's Camp and one AHSAA State Official's Camp. AHSAA District or State Official's Camps may occur during the summer months or during the school year after the first practice date for that sport and before the regular season in that sport begins.

LOCAL ASSOCIATION CONTACT PERSON

The contact person in each local association is a currently registered AHSAA official who is responsible for communicating any and all information to and from the AHSAA office, schools and coaches to the appropriate officers, board members or the general membership of the local association. This individual should be a responsible person who is easily accessible. This person shall establish a valid and current email address and report it to the state office upon becoming the local association contact person. This person must be able to navigate within the AHSAA Online Officials Section. This person must be approved by the AHSAA. Local Association Contacts are listed online at AHSAA.com.

AHSAA MINIMUM STANDARDS

Regular Associations

1. Each Association must consist of a minimum number of AHSAA registered officials and must have an Employer Identification Number. (See list below).

Baseball 12	Softball 12

Soccer 12	Wrestling 8
2. Each association shall conduct at least four associational rules meetings prior to any of its members working a regular season contest. The local association shall conduct a minimum of two associational meetings each month during the regular season.
3. All officials registering with the Alabama High School Athletic Association must complete the AHSAA Online Rules Clinic plus two associational rules meetings before being assigned to officiate during the current season.
4. Any official registered with the Alabama High School Athletic Association shall be a member of only one local AHSAA affiliated association. An official can only receive AHSAA contest assignments through his or her local association.(Assignment Committee or Booking Agent) Any violation will result in suspension from the AHSAA for a period of one year. A local association may borrow officials from another association with the permission of both booking agents.
5. Each association will hold a dress inspection of uniforms prior to its first scheduled contest. All necessary adjustments will be made so that all officials are in the exact uniform, and all patches are the same and in their proper place. Any official out of uniform will be suspended for two weeks. (Failure to wear the AHSAA patches in their proper places constitutes being out of uniform!) Two such violations in the same year will result in a suspension for a period of one year.
6. An official will not be assigned to officiate two consecutive varsity contests for the same school. All scratches by home and visiting teams must be honored. Each association will send a scratch list to the contracted school and upon written request to the visiting school at least one week prior to the beginning of the school's sport season. Coaches shall not influence the local association assignment of officials.
7. Any official having close ties with a school shall not officiate any contest involving that school. For example but not limited to: close relatives, school employees, former school employees (within 5 years), or recent school graduates (within 5 years).
8. A maximum of 10% or a minimum of one official of an association's roster may be scratched by each participating school at least one week prior to the beginning of the school's sport season. (This may not exceed more than a maximum of 10% or a minimum of one official of any race or gender within the membership of any association.) Thereafter, scratches are permitted only through the sanction of the State Office.
9. A planned rules program will be conducted at each meeting. Topic assignments will be made in advance and covered thoroughly before other areas or topics may be discussed.
10. Any person at least sixteen years of age may be recruited and registered as an

AHSAA official. Any individual convicted of a felony shall not be allowed to register with the AHSAA until the sentence has been completed.

All AHSAA officials must take and pass a pre-registration exam. A grade of at least 80% is required to pass the pre-registration exam. Any official age 16-18 can only register as a restricted official. Any official ages 16 and above who makes at least 70% and below 80% on the pre-registration exam may register as a restricted official. Restricted officials can only work contests at the Junior High or Middle School level. They may serve as clock operators at the varsity level.

All officials must complete the STAR Sportsmanship Program before officiating an AHSAA contest. This is required only once during an officials career.

11. Officials who use tobacco of any kind in the vicinity of the playing field before, during, or after the contest shall be suspended for two weeks.
12. The association must not adopt any rules or regulations that conflict with the rules and regulations of the Alabama High School Athletic Association.
13. An official will be suspended for a minimum of one year if he consumes alcoholic beverages on the same day he officiates prior to a contest.
14. An official's use of profanity or other unsportsmanlike conduct shall be grounds for a minimum two-week suspension.
15. An official may be suspended up to a period of one year if he accepts an AHSAA local association assignment and then rejects it for another assignment with a Non-AHSAA organization.

An official may also be suspended a minimum of two weeks for failing to fulfill an AHSAA Playoff assignment or failing to attend a State Officials campe once accepted

16. Any official suspended from a local association shall not be allowed membership in any other local association for the remainder of that season or until such time during the same season as the suspension may be removed by the local association.
17. Each association must include the following standing committees:
 - A. Membership Committee
 - (a) To recruit new officials for the association.
 - (b) To screen all applicants and make recommendations for membership.
 - (c) All members of this committee must be a currently registered AHSAA official.
 - B. Program Training Committee
 - (a) To train, instruct, or direct inexperienced and experienced officials through a well-planned program of instructions on rules and mechanics of officiating.
 - (b) Be responsible for a planned program on the rules or mechanics for each meeting. Plan and conduct programs on specific problem areas as reported by members of the association or State Office.
 - (c) All members of this committee must be a currently registered AHSAA official.
 - C. Assignment Committee
 - (a) To make all initial assignments according to the schedule of the schools being served.
 - (b) The secretary or booking agent makes any necessary adjustments after the initial assignments are made as needs arise and is responsible for assuring every school of a complete crew of officials.
 - (c) All members of this committee must be a currently registered AHSAA official.
 - D. Grievance Committee
 - (a) Investigate charges, disputes, and complaints made by coaches, school officials, or members of the association.
 - (b) Conduct hearings on problems pertaining to or within the local official's association and report its findings to the Board of Directors. The Board of Directors upon appeal will make a binding decision and will notify the

State Office.

- (c) Board members and officers cannot serve on this committee.
 - (d) All members of this committee must be a currently registered AHSAA official.
- E. Ethics Committee
- (a) To observe the conduct of the officials at the meetings, on the field, and when possible, after contests.
 - (b) To hold meetings on the proper conduct of an official in a general manner, and hold individual conferences in a professional way with an official who has personal problems in or with his officiating responsibilities.
 - (c) All members of this committee must be a currently registered AHSAA official.
- F. Election Committee
- (a) To conduct annual elections of all officer positions by the general membership for the association. All officer positions may be elected for 2 years staggered terms if the local association chooses to do so.
 - (b) To assure that current AHSAA registered members are the only members allowed to vote.
 - (c) To assure that officers or board members are elected by proper procedure as directed by the association constitution for the following season at the conclusion of the current season.
 - (d) An individual member of an association cannot be elected to more than one officer's position during the same year.
 - (e) All members of this committee must be a currently registered AHSAA official.
18. A local affiliated association cannot assign officials to non-AHSAA contracted contests during that AHSAA sport season until all AHSAA member school contests have been assigned.
19. A current copy of the Association's Constitution and By-Laws must be filed with the AHSAA office. An association that does not have its Constitution and By-Laws on file with the State Office may not receive registration of its officials. A copy of the Constitution and By-Laws along with a local association financial statement must be made available to each official at the beginning of each season.

Restricted Associations

Items numbered 1, 2, 3, 6, 7, 9, 17, and 18 are not required for Restricted Associations.

LOCAL OFFICIALS ASSOCIATION WORKSHOP GUIDELINES

1. A school cannot participate in more than one workshop.
2. The officials association can only invite the schools with whom they contract during the current season. Every school with whom you contract must be invited.
3. No admission can be charged.
4. Modified rules regarding length of activity shall be used to ensure that a team does not play a regulation game against another team.
5. National Federation Rules will always apply concerning safety.

6. Score will not be kept for the purposes of declaring a winner.
7. The workshop can last no longer than one day with no loss of school time.
8. The workshop must be scheduled between the starting practice date and each school's first contest.
9. The officials association can only conduct one workshop per year.
10. An official workshop must be approved by the state office according to the above guidelines.

ASSOCIATION PROCEDURE

Affiliation

1. A letter requesting the approval of a new association must be sent to the State Office. In addition, the following information is to be provided.
 - a. A list of applicants (minimum number as required by the minimum standards) must be submitted in conjunction with this letter to the State Office.
 - b. Evidence must be provided to the State Office that a new association is needed in that location. This evidence must include but is not limited to a list of schools that are willing to contract with the new association. Letters from each of the schools listed must be included in the evidence submitted. (Minimum of 4)
 - c. The letter must indicate to the State Office whether or not the new association is requesting Restricted (see classifications in Officials Guide) status or Regular status.
2. The State Office will approve or disapprove the application for affiliation based on all information provided to or obtained by the State Office prior to the officers' meeting for that sport.

Dissolution

1. If a regular local association fails to meet any of the minimum standards specified in the Officials Guide, it is subject to being dissolved of AHSAA affiliation. If a regular local association fails to contract with a minimum of 4 AHSAA member schools for a season, it may be placed on probation, reduced to Restricted Status or be subject to being dissolved of AHSAA affiliation. The local association will be notified in writing at the time this is done.
2. When dissolved, a local association must wait a period of two years before it will be eligible to regain affiliated status. After two years have passed, regular or probationary status may be granted to the dissolved association when it has followed the application procedure given in the Officials Guide for new associations. The local association will be notified in writing at the conclusion of the current school year as to its status for the following school year.

OFFICIAL UNIFORMS

The official uniforms for each AHSAA sport are listed below. No exceptions will be made for the uniform of any sport. It is considered being out of uniform if long sleeves of any color are worn visibly under an acceptable short sleeved officials shirt. If the weather is cold enough for long sleeves then wear the acceptable long sleeved shirt or the acceptable jacket. This applies to all sports.

BASEBALL

Gray Long Pants, Cliff Keen Major League Style Pro Knit Navy Blue Mesh Shirt, short sleeved with three-button placket and with white, navy and scarlet knit trim on collar and cuffs or long sleeved Navy Blue Shirt (Cliff Keen), AHSAA Navy Blue New Era or Richardson fitted cap with 1 1/2 in. full block lettering, Navy Blue or Black Belt, Navy Blue Undershirt, two Navy Blue or Gray Ball Bag(s), Predominately Black Shoes and Navy Blue or Black Socks, AHSAA Navy Blue Pullover Jacket if worn. "The Hook" (optional). A black on black or black on tan face mask is proper. Hockey style masks are allowed. The AHSAA cap is not required while wearing the hockey style mask. It must be worn at all other times. **Wrist watches are not part of the uniform and shall not be worn. AHSAA baseball patch centered below the top hem on the left breast pocket area. No other patches or organization logos of any kind on the uniform at all except the American Flag. It may be worn on the left sleeve. Local Association Numbers if worn, shall be worn on upper right sleeve of the shirt or AHSAA Jacket.** Sunglasses may be worn as long as they serve a purpose and are not for show.

BASKETBALL

Standard Black and White Vertically Striped Short Sleeved Regular or Micro-Meshed Shirt with Black V-Neck Collar, Black Lanyard, Black Whistle, Non-Flared, Black Pants, Black Socks, Predominately Black Shoes and Black Laces, Black Belt (if worn), AHSAA Black Jacket (if worn), **AHSAA Basketball Patch centered below the top hem on the left breast pocket area. No other patches or organization logos of any kind on the uniform at all except the American Flag. It may be worn on the left sleeve. Wrist watches are not part of the uniform and shall not be worn.**

FOOTBALL

Black and White Vertically Striped Long or Short Sleeved Regular Knit or Micro-Meshed Shirt, Standard All White Tapered Knickers, One-Piece Black Stockings with Modified Northwestern Stripe, Low-Cut Predominately Black Football Shoes and Black Laces, Black Baseball Cap with White Piping (Referee shall wear Solid White Baseball Cap), Black Leather Belt with Plain Buckle, Black and White Vertically Striped Jacket. Adjustable caps are not permitted. Every member of each crew must be dressed alike during the contest. **AHSAA Football Patch centered below the top hem on the left breast pocket area. No other patches or organization logos of any kind on the uniform at all except the American Flag. It may be worn on the left sleeve.** Local association patches may only be worn on jackets.

SOCCER

A Fuschia Collared Shirt with Black Pin Stripes or a Black and White Striped Colared Shirt with One Inch Stripes and a Pocket, Black shorts or pants, Black stockings with White tops or stripes, Predominately Black shoes and Black laces. Every member of each crew must be dressed alike during the contest. **AHSAA Soccer Patch centered below the top hem on the left breast pocket. No other patches or organization logos of any kind on the uniform at all except the American Flag. It may be worn on the left sleeve.**

SOFTBALL

AHSAA Cliff Keen Powder Blue Major League Style Nylon Dazzle Cloth Shirt, or Major League Style Pro Knit Mesh Shirt with White, Powder Blue and Navy Knit Trim on Collar and Cuffs or Long Sleeved Powder Blue Shirt (Cliff Keen), Gray Long Pants, Navy Blue Undershirt, Predominately Black Shoes with Navy Blue or Black Socks, and belt, two Navy Blue Ball bags, AHSAA Navy Blue New Era or Richardson Fitted Cap with 1 1/2 Full Block Lettering, AHSAA Navy Blue Jacket if worn. "The Hook" (optional). A black on black or black on tan face mask is proper. Hockey style masks are allowed. The AHSAA cap is not required while wearing the hockey style mask. It must be worn at all other times. **AHSAA Softball Patch centered below the top hem on the left breast pocket area. No other patches organization logos of any kind on the uniform at all except the American Flag. It may be worn on the left sleeve. Wrist watches are not part of the uniform and shall not be worn. Local Association Numbers if worn, shall be worn on upper right sleeve of the shirt or AHSAA Jacket.** Sunglasses may be worn as long as they serve a purpose and are not for show.

VOLLEYBALL

AHSAA White Outer Banks 100% combed cotton or AHSAA white Harriton mixed blend, side-seamed sport shirt with contoured welt collar and cuffs. Two or three button placket, Navy Blue Slacks or Dress Shorts (mid-thigh length), Navy Blue Belt if worn, Solid White Shoes with Solid White Socks. Every member of each crew must be dressed alike during the match. **AHSAA Volleyball Patch centered below the top hem on the left breast pocket area. No other patches or organization logos of any kind on the uniform at all except for the American Flag. It may be worn on the left sleeve.**

WRESTLING

A Black and White Vertically Striped Short Sleeved Knit or Micro-Mesh Shirt with Black V-Neck Collar, Non Flared Long Black Pants, Black Belt (If Worn), Black Socks and Predominately Black Shoes. **AHSAA Wrestling Patch centered below the top hem on the left breast pocket area. No other patches or organization logos of any kind on the uniform at all except the American Flag. It may be worn on the left sleeve.**

TRACK

AHSAA White Outer Banks 100% combed cotton or AHSAA white Harriton mixed blend, side-seamed sport shirt with contoured welt collar and cuffs. Placket with buttons, Khaki Slacks or Dress Shorts (mid-thigh length), Black or Navy Blue Belt if worn, Solid White Shoes with Solid White Socks. A hat or cap may be worn. Sunglasses may be worn as long as they serve a purpose and are not for show. Every member of each crew must be dressed alike during the meet. **AHSAA Track Patch centered below the top hem on the left breast pocket area. No other patches or organization logos of any kind on the uniform at all except for the American Flag. It may be worn on the left sleeve.**

MAXIMUM FEE SCHEDULE

Officiating fees should be agreed upon by negotiations between the local officials association and the school. The AHSAA highly recommends that joint responsibility be assumed in the negotiations. The accomplishment of any such agreement can be complete only when the fee or fees agreed upon are within the ability of the school to pay and are also commensurate with the services rendered. Any agreed-upon fees must be within the maximum amount the schools are allowed to pay by the AHSAA Maximum Fee Schedule.

All officials understand that they are independent contractors officiating for the schools serviced by their local associations and the AHSAA. They agree when they register to abide by the constitution and by-laws of their local associations with whom they voluntarily choose to affiliate. They also agree to abide by all of the rules and regulations of the AHSAA with whom they voluntarily choose to affiliate during the current registration year.

They also understand that they are independent agents choosing to affiliate with their local associations and the AHSAA. Therefore, they release their local association officers and the AHSAA staff from any liability or responsibility for any damage or injury incurred by them to themselves or anyone else because of their officiating during the current registration year.

Finally, they understand that all taxes due on the income collected by them because of their officiating are their responsibility to file and not the responsibility of their local association or the AHSAA. The AHSAA will enroll the official in the NFOA (NFHS Organization) which will entitle the official to benefits provided by that organization as soon as the official completes the registration process for the current registration year.

Method of Calculating Milage

Regular Season and Championship Playoffs

(All sports at all levels) = the approved milage rate is posted on the website (AHSAA.com). It calculates the fee payment per mile both ways for one car based from the centralized site as indicated below.

The milage to the contracted schools from the local association will be used as set by the local association when they determine a centralized point. This centralized point will be based on the location of the local association's contracted schools.

If one or more schools dispute this centralized site as determined by the local association, upon written request, the AHSAA will make the determination of the centralized site to be used by that local association.

All centralized sites as determined by the local officials associations will be sent to the AHSAA prior to August 1st for the Fall Sports, October 1st for the Winter Sports, and January 1st for the Spring Sports for approval. The online program will then be used to determine the approved mileage. The mileage rate will be the same as used by the State Department of Education.

Other Fees

The fees that the schools are allowed to pay are outlined in the AHSAA Officials Guide. The schools will not be allowed to pay any other fees without the approval from the Central Board.

The Central Board has previously approved an administrative fee for the local associations if the local associations take responsibility for handling all IRS Tax Requirements. This is the only additional fee that has been approved. A fee of \$35 per school per sport is acceptable for this purpose.

GUIDELINES USED FOR SELECTION TO PRELIMINARY ROUND AND CHAMPIONSHIP FINALS GAMES

1. Classification of Official

WARM-UP AND STRETCHING FOR OFFICIALS

Proper warm-up and stretching are important to contest officials because both can **help reduce the risk of injury and improve performance**. Warming up also lowers ones blood pressure and increases blood flow to the heart which **reduces the risk of a heart attack**.

Warm-up improves the rate of muscle contractions, decreases reaction time, increases muscle temperature making the tissue more elastic, and increases circulation to the muscles resulting in a greater oxygen supply. Despite the lack of scientific documentation, it appears that all of these changes result in improved performance and decreased risk of injury.

Warm-up can be performed in three ways: passive, active, general warm-up, and active, specific warm-up. Passive warm-up involves the use of warm showers or whirlpools, heating pads, saunas, massage, or analgesic creams. Evidence has shown that **passive warm-up methods do not penetrate deeply enough into the muscle tissue to result in a significant temperature increase in the muscles** that perform most of the work during activity. In fact, passive warm-up techniques may result in a dilation of the blood vessels near the skin, drawing blood away from the muscles. Reduced blood flow to the muscles results in decreased performance and increased risk of injury. **Passive warm-up should never be the sole method of warm-up prior to activity.**

Active, general warm-up involves performing a few basic activities that require the use of major muscle groups. These activities may include walking, jogging, cycling, jumping rope, or calisthenics. Active, **general warm-up is fairly effective in raising the temperature of the major muscle groups**. This approach is better than passive warm-up, but it still may not warm up the specific muscles used when officiating.

Active, specific warm-up includes movements that are an actual part of the activity to be performed. A baseball player swinging a weighted bat, a tennis player practicing a backhand motion, a quarterback throwing passes, and an official practicing the various movements used during the contest are all examples of active, specific warm-up. **Active, specific warm-up increases the temperature of the muscles and allows for rehearsal of specific skills that will be used in the activity. Active, general warm-up followed by active, specific warm-up is the best way to warm-up.**

The **warm-up period should last 5-15 minutes** depending on the intensity of the activity to follow. The more intense the activity, the longer the warm-up period should be. Warm-up intensity should gradually be increased until it is near that of the activity to be performed. A general rule is **one should break a light sweat when warming up, but not be working hard enough to breathe heavily**. A rest period of 5-10 minutes should follow the warm-up prior to competition. A warm-up remains effective in increasing muscle temperature for about 45 minutes after it has been completed, depending on the environmental conditions.

Stretching also prepares the muscles for work and reduces the risk of muscle injury. The benefits of stretching warm muscles are a decreased risk of injury, improved performance, delay in muscular fatigue, and reduction of muscle soreness. However, **stretching muscles that have not been warmed up may cause them to be more prone to injuries**, such as tears and strains. **Stretching exercises should only be performed after a period of active, general warm-up which lasts at least 5 minutes!**

Pain and/or bouncing during stretching are counterproductive and unsafe! Pain and/or bouncing activate the stretch reflex in the muscles being stretched. The stretch reflex is a protective mechanism that causes the muscle to contract, or shorten, to avoid excessively stretching to the point of injury. You should feel as though you could maintain a stretch comfortably for five minutes, even though the recommended time is much less than that. **Stretch slowly to the point of mild tension never pain!**

When stretching properly, a mild stretch should be felt in the belly of the muscle, not in any of the joints. For example, when stretching the hamstrings or quadriceps, the aim is to feel the stretch in the back or front of the thigh, not in the knee or hip.

The two most common and effective methods of stretching are static stretching and proprioceptive neuromuscular facilitation (PNF). Static stretching is performed by placing the body into a position that places a stretch on a group of muscles. That position is maintained for 30-60 seconds putting a constant, gentle stretch on the muscles. The stretch should be repeated 5-10 times.

An excellent time to perform static stretching is after a workout. Stretching at this time will help to alleviate delayed muscle soreness and has the added benefit of improving flexibility.

When utilizing PNF, instead of maintaining constant tension on the muscles being stretched, the muscles are stretched for 5-10 seconds. Then, while continuing to place a mild stretch on the muscles, they are mildly contracted (tightened) for 10-30 seconds. When this contraction phase is over, the stretch is continued for another 5-15 seconds. This procedure of stretch – contract – stretch should be repeated 3-5 times before moving to the next muscle group to be stretched. **It is often necessary to do PNF stretching with a partner.**

In summary, officials should never use passive warm-ups as the only method of warming up before an activity. The best method of warming up is to use active, general warm-up followed by active, specific warm-up. When warming up, one should break a light sweat, but not be working hard enough to cause heavy breathing. Prior to activity, stretching exercises should only be performed after a period of active, general warm-up. Stretching after exercise can help alleviate delayed muscle soreness and improve flexibility. **Pain and/or bouncing are always counterproductive and unsafe when stretching!**
